Background to the project

Objective:

"To support local governments in <u>six</u> small and medium-sized towns in Lango sub- region in Northern Uganda to <u>develop</u> and <u>implement</u> sustainable and comprehensive town-wide sanitation plans."



The (obvious) problems of small towns

- Low population densities (range 7000 45000)
- Low income levels:
 - 60% USD 1.00/day
 - 25% USD 2.00/days
 - 15% USD 5.50/days
- Low (or no) economies of scale to operationalise FSM
- Lack of private sector involvement
- Higher cost of basic toilets
- Weaker capacities of local government, but higher motivation



The (not so obvious) opportunities in small towns

- Social fabric is more homogeneous
- Easy to motivate political actors in favour of sanitation
- LG accountability to the local population is higher
- Citizens participation in the process is easier to achieve
- (Most) Activities get done quicker
