




Did you know that tiny things live all around us.

Sometimes they are so small that you cannot even see them. If you fill your bucket with sand at the seaside, you might have the same number of these tiny things under your finger nail as you have sand grains in your bucket.

Some of these little things are good for us. They take care of our tummies and handle our food waste, just like little dustmen. Some are used to make medicines – they are like tiny doctors!

But some make people sick. We call them bugs. Do you remember when you were sick? You might have had a sore throat or tummy ache, and that's because bugs got into your body - probably when you touched your food after touching a bug, or put your hands in your mouth.

DIFFERENT KIND OF BUGS




Bacteria live everywhere. They can give you a sore head or a sore ear or make you sick.



Viruses live inside a plant, person or animal. They cause illnesses like chicken pox, which will make you itchy and spotty.



Fungi are a bit like plants, and like to live in damp, warm places, like shower rooms. Fungi can make you itch and smell.



Protozoa live in water. They can give you a tummy ache, make you sick or make you need the toilet a lot.

HOW DO BUGS GET IN TO OUR BODY?

Well they might come from:

- Other people, when we touch their hands
- Things other people have touched, like footballs, phones, door handles, lift buttons or computers
- Animals
- Dirt when we play outdoors
- Places that lots of people use, like shops, buses and trains and public toilets

We might touch these things and then put our hands in our mouths, or on our food. So we should wash and dry our hands lots of times through the day! Making sure we do not spread bugs is what "good hygiene" is all about. The most important thing to do is to keep your hands nice and clean.






PASS THE BUG


Play this fun game to see how bugs spread around.

- 1. Stand next to each other and form a circle.
- 2. One child covers his/her hand with paint, glitter or flour.
- Now he/she shakes hands with the next child, and then the next child shakes hands with the next one until the whole circle has shaken hands.
- Now take a look at your hands. Bugs can stpread from person to person just like the paint, glitter or flour.

That's why washing hands can stop you getting sick! Now wash your hands!












OUR CLASS HYGIENE RULES

To remind all the pupils at your school about the importance of hand washing, draw signs and decorate the hand washing area in classroom or school corridor. Make them stand out!











Fold your very own paper bug! Follow the instructions carefully to get the right result. Ask for help from your teacher, if necessary.




Begin green side up. Fold and unfold so that the top edge lines-up with the side edge.




Turn over the paper. Fold and unfold the top of the page where the previous folds cross.




Turn over the paper again. Fold top corners down. Fold midpoints inwards.




Fold the top layer in half, bringing the top to the bottom, and turn the bug over.




Well done! You are finished. You can press here to make the bug jump.



Fold up the top two corners just short of the centre line, so they point a little.



Fold in half, bringing the bottom to the top.




Fold out rear legs.




Fold sides to the centre.

BEAT THE BUGS BOARD GAME

What you need:

2–4 counters + dice. If you don't have a game appendix with cut-out dice & counters in your book, ask a teacher to provide you with them.

Game rules:

- 2–4 players
- Players throw the dice in turns and move their counter according to the spots showing on the dice
- On the way you will land on occasions that require hand washing and get +points or -points based on occasion type
- You should move forwards (+) or backwards (-) according to the points and the occasions are described in the game board
- Whoever finishes first, wins!
