

A SHORT HISTORY OF HAND HYGIENE...

Since man evolved, there has always been a need for hand washing.

At first, sand was used to remove dirt from hands but the beginning of the modern soap dates back to Roman times. For a long time, hands were washed for convenience's sake: to avoid unpleasant odours, to get a better grip and so on. It took a long time to find out that hand hygiene and the prevention of infections were closely connected.

In 1847 Hungarian-born physician Ignaz Semmelweis noticed that fatal childbed fever occurred more frequently in women who were assisted by medical students, compared with those who were assisted by midwives. The reason was that medical students often rushed to help after performing autopsies – without washing their hands in between. After Semmelweis's observation, hygiene started to improve in hospitals.

TOPIC FOR DISCUSSION IN THE CLASSROOM

Most animal species keep themselves clean, in one way or another. Ask if your pupils know how different animals clean themselves.





All these diseases could have been prevented with proper hand hygiene

1634	Smallpox killed 95 % of the American Indians
1812-13	Just 30 000 of Napoleon's 600 000 troops survived outbreaks of typhus and dysentery
1861-65	Three times as many Civil War soldiers fell victim to dysentery, typhoid fever, smallpox and measles than were killed in battle
1918	The most lethal influenza epidemic ever swept the world with troops in World War 1, killing 20 million to 40 million

But the future looks brighter: hand hygiene had a crucial role in controlling the recent H1N1 pandemic!

AMAZING FACTS ABOUT BACTERIA

DID YOU KNOW?

- An average office desk can be contaminated with 100 times more bacteria than the kitchen table and 400 times more bacteria than the average toilet seat
- The area where you rest your hand on your desk has, on average,
 10 million bacteria
- A mobile phone carries 18 times more potentially harmful germs than a flush handle in a men's toilet
- The number of bacteria present on an elevator button is almost
 40 times higher than on a public toilet seat

SOME BASIC RULES

- Micro organisms grow and multiply in standing water
- Do not dip or wash your hands in a basin that contains standing water, even if an antiseptic solution is added!
- Always use running water
- Warm water dissolves the soap's substances better than cold water
- Always rinse your hands under warm water, it's more effective and much more pleasant!

DISCUSS ALSO

NOT ALL BACTERIA IS BAD FOR PEOPLE AND TOO MUCH HAND WASHING MAY IRRITATE THE SKIN KEEP IT REASONABLE. HAVE FUN AND STAY HEALTHY!

After washing hands, proper drying is essential. Below you can see how much the bacteria decreases in each step.




Contaminated hands

THIS IS THE

UTILISING THE HYGIENE SCHOOL BOOK

We realise that as a teacher, your time is limited. There are just so many topics to teach! That's why we have broken down the content of the school book into three easy modules which you can utilise whenever you have time. This module approach also helps to keep hand hygiene in the pupils' minds for a longer period of time.



HYGIENE PASS

The Hygiene Pass is intended to reward your pupils for learning. The idea is that pupils can colour golden stars after completing tasks that are marked as hygiene star exercises. When all stars have been coloured, the pupils can cut out the Hygiene Badge and proudly claim the title of "bug hunter". The badge could be attached with sticky tape. As alternative for colouring in, you may like to apply a gold star sticker.

IST PHASE: THE BUG BASICS AND HOW TO WASH


General information about "tiny villains and heroes" and importance of hand hygiene.

2ND PHASE: WHEN TO WASH

There are plenty of situations when handwashing pays off and this module helps to memorise them all.

3RD PHASE: KEEPING IT UP

At its best, hand hygiene becomes a natural habit. This module concentrates on keeping up hand washing. NOTE! CORRECT ANSWERS FOR THE EXERCISES CAN BE FOUND AT THE END OF THIS BOOK AND AT THE END OF THE PUPILS' BOOKS AS WELL.



IST PHASE: THE BUG BASICS

WHAT TO COMMUNICATE?

Introduce the exercise books and talk about the Hygiene Pass. Before going to the exercises, elaborate pages 2–5, introduce bugs and the meaning of hand hygiene. Use anecdotes, such as these:

- Most of the tiny creatures inside our body and on our skin are completely harmless and some of them are very useful.
- There are 5 million bugs on the skin of your hand and 500 million bugs under a ring (use country populations to help them understand the scale of the numbers).
- The average human hand houses 150 different species of bug, which can cause a range of diseases and may result in fevers, headaches, tummy ache and sickness.

Pass the Bug -game, page 5	The children form a circle and shake hands with paint, glitter or flour in them to explore how bugs spread.	Paint, glitter or flour
Learning hand washing, page 8	Go through hand washing step by step with your pupils. A good way to measure time for hand washing is to say the alphabet.	Water station, soap, towels.
Guess where?	Let your pupils guess where there are most bacteria at home.	Correct answers: 1. Toilet bowl 2. Kitchen drain 3. Kitchen sponge 4. Bathtub 5. Kitchen sink

School Book page 16 & 18. Check if the task is correct and award your pupils with shining hygiene stars.

WHAT TO COMMUNICATE?

Discuss with your pupils where bugs can be found: usually places which are not cleaned regularly and which a lot of people touch daily, like door knobs. Talk about the things that we all could do in order to prevent diseases from spreading, like remembering to wash our own hands and also reminding our peers to do likewise.

WHAT TO COMMUNICATE?

At this point, your pupils have probably understood the importance of hand washing. Phase three is all about repeating key learnings and thinking of ways to spread the message. Prepare the counters and dice for the Beat the Bugs Board Game (see School Book appendix available at katrin.com) or ask the children to bring these from home in order to play the game. The game rules you will find from the manual page 15.




HOMEWORK OR SUPPLEMENTARY TASKS:

Players throw the dice in turns and move their counter according to the spots showing on the dice


On the way you will land on occasions that require hand washing and get **+points** or **-points** based on occasion type

Dry your hands carefully.




Rub it for 20 seconds, or as long as it takes to say the alphabet.
