Challenges in Sector Management Structure

Strategy development and outreach to relevant authorities

- Access to data
- Level of responsiveness
- Lack of interest due to current crisis
- **Politics**

Ability to influence decision makers

- Water and wastewater management
- Reforms
- **Environment/pollution**
- Governance

Consultation by institutional actors

- Qualified staff
- Data availability
- Only when contacted

Need to partner with international organizations

> Donors' requirements

Years of experiences on the field and with local actors

Data availability

Raw data availability/sharin

> Support from municipalities (info and staff)

Current economic crisis

Raw materials prices







Challenges in Advocacy

Providing lessons learnt to public authorities

Only in project handover or accomplishment

Rarely coordinate with them - need of coordination mechanism

- support to RWEs








Challenges in Partnership
